



## California Climate Credit bill relief from the Cap-and-Invest Program

This April\* your utility bill will include a \$71.98 credit identified as the "California Climate Credit." Your household and millions of others throughout the State will receive a similar credit on their utility bill.

The California Climate Credit is a direct result of the State's nation-leading Cap-and-Invest Program that requires polluters to pay for climate pollution. Credits are distributed in April and October each year. Credits appear automatically on your bill and are designed to help utility customers during the transition to a more sustainable future.

Since 2014, California's Liberty Utilities households like yours have already received an average of \$1,057 in California Climate Credits on your electric utility bills, totaling more than \$10 billion in Cap-and-Invest Program cumulative benefits statewide.
